
It has been a busy year, and one in which I have tried to promote the specialty and continue to raise our profile on both the national and international scene. In January, I was invited to attend and contribute to the first joint meeting between the American Societies of Paediatric Neurosurgery and Craniofacial Surgery. The conference was well organised and I had the opportunity to present and debate on the role of posterior cranial vault distraction; a technique pioneered in Birmingham and which has gained worldwide recognition. It was a chance to develop links with surgeons based in large teaching hospitals in America, which I hope will allow for exchanges in coming years. There is no doubt in my mind that the barriers that existed in the past between various 'head and neck' specialties are being broken down to the benefit of everyone, not least our patients.

I presented at the cleft and craniofacial conference in Chennai in February and also at the ICOMS meeting in Hong Kong. Both conferences were well attended and it was good to be able to meet up with old acquaintances and make new friends. I had the impression that OMFS in the UK remains a well-respected part of the world-wide community and that we continue to be at the forefront of many areas of clinical practice.


The Annual Scientific Meeting



with our main sponsor – Stryker. Anthony Summerwill and Straumann ran a one day implant course, and Rob Banks and his colleagues who, with Nobel BioCare, ran an advanced implant workshop concentrating on full arch reconstructions. Nearly 600 delegates attended the three days and heard invited speakers from Europe, Australia, India and the USA. I am grateful to the invited speakers from the UK, who all gave outstanding contributions to the programme. Mike Simpson was the worthy recipient of the Down Surgical Prize, reflecting his outstanding and long serving contribution to our speciality. My colleague Andrew Monaghan was the President's speaker and gave a real masterclass on the contemporary management of vascular anomalies – a complex and under-served area of OMFS. I hope his presentation has given younger colleagues the inspiration to develop this area of clinical practice. The Norman Rowe lecture was delivered by Professor Sir Keith Porter, Chair of Clinical Traumatology at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Birmingham. His overview of military and civilian casualty management in Afghanistan and Birmingham, and how this has influenced trauma care in the UK, gave a unique insight into recent and important developments in this field.

Dr Douglas Fain and Dr Brett Ferguson (President and President Elect of AAOMS respectively) and their wives joined us as guests of BAOMS and I in turn was invited to their meeting in San Francisco in October. They were very generous hosts and I had free rein to visit the various presentations, masterclasses and discussions and to wander around the exhibition hall and visit the trade stands. A significant group of OMFS surgeons in the States are developing practices similar to our own in the UK. I was particularly pleased to see how the introduction of new education tools, such as cognitive simulation led by Professor Dan Buchbinder, are becoming an important part of OMFS training. Some of you may not know that the medal of office that I am wearing in the photograph on the front cover was donated to our Association by AAOMS. There remains a close bond between our two organisations, and I am delighted to announce that we have agreed a joint meeting in Birmingham in 2019. This will be hosted by our President that year, Sat Parmar, and his American counterpart Dr Thomas Indresano, who is based in San Francisco.

The International Society of Craniofacial Surgery held its Biennial conference in Cancun, Mexico at the end of October. I now sit on Council and am the first maxillofacial surgeon to do so. This again



reflects the increasing recognition of who we are and what we do. The meeting was well attended with sessions that included cleft, facial trauma, skull base surgery and reconstruction. The European meeting will be in Athens next October and in 2019 Eric Arnaud hosts the International meeting in Paris - perhaps something for the diary if you have any interest in this field of clinical practice.

The President's Initiative

Each year the in-coming President has an opportunity to develop an initiative for the benefit of the speciality. I was very conscious, both during my time on the SAC and more recently, that a working week limited to 48 hours and a five-year training scheme impacts on how much any trainee can be exposed to. The award of a CCT denotes competence in the generality of the speciality of OMFS. Sub-specialty expertise can only come with further training. This is already acknowledged and to some extent covered with the TiG fellowships. However, I realised that significant areas of specialist OMFS practice did not easily fit into most training rotations. I therefore looked to develop post-CCT fellowships to address these shortfalls. Money has been set aside to support this initiative, which is being endorsed by the Royal College of Surgeons of England fellowship scheme. Units have come forward with proposals for TMJ management, sentinel node and skin, sleep apnoea, major trauma and endocrine surgery. Further rounds of applications will be launched in the New Year

and with funding available for these post CCT fellowships I would encourage those nearing the end of training to consider applying.

Individual's Roles

David Koppel completes his term of office as SAC Chair at the end of the year. He is to be congratulated on all the hard work that he has put into the role. In particular he has worked with the GMC and GDC to look at ways to reduce the length of OMFS training. This is very much work in progress. I am delighted to inform you that David's successor will be Emma Woolley. Emma is a consultant in North Wales and Director of Medical Education. She has a wealth of experience in teaching and training and is a former Head of School of Surgery. I am sure you will all want to join me in congratulating her on this appointment.

Maire Morton has been leading on Getting It Right First Time (GIRFT). I would encourage those units who have yet to host a visit from her to do so. It is very enlightening to see how much disparity there is around the country, with various procedures being coded under different specialties and even the same procedure being coded differently or sometimes not at all. As these codes are used in manpower planning and the development of model hospital matrices, it is important that there is a clear understanding and recognition of what we do, how much we do and who does it.

Patrick Magennis, Chair of Council, has worked hard to promote OMFS within the Association of Surgeons in Training (ASiT), with the result that for the first time a UK specialty Association has offered free e-membership to ASiT. This organisation is active in medical politics and has representatives on consultation and review bodies and at medical school, foundation, core and Deanery level. Prizes and bursaries are available to support research and travel opportunities. From our perspective, we hope that this will raise the profile of both the specialty and of BAOMS it and it should help trainees stay informed about the rapidly changing world of surgery in the UK.

And finally...

BAOMS is only as successful and as representative as the individuals who support it. The officers work hard to promote the specialty and I am grateful to them for their continuing efforts, particularly when there are challenges and pressures from all quarters of the NHS that impact on the time they have to give to the Association. There are a number of vacancies due to arise on Council over the next year or so as existing members complete their term of office. Could I ask all those of you who are eligible, to consider applying? It will give you a chance to better understand what we are trying to achieve as an Association and more importantly to influence what we do and how we do it.

I should like to say a few thank yous; to the consultant colleagues and trainees with whom I work in Birmingham and who have been unfailingly supportive of my commitments; to Sarah Durham and Susan Bailey in our BAOMS office - they organise the national conference with amazing efficiency and skill and this year have had to juggle this around moving offices as the Royal College of Surgeons undergoes a period of major refurbishment; and last but not least to my family, who have put up with years of late nights, early mornings and time away from home.

The role of President is transient but the memories and the privilege of holding this office are not and I remain deeply honoured to have been elected. I wish Ian Martin every success in his coming year and look forward to attending his conference without the pressures of hosting the event myself!



Don't just talk about it in the pub or moan to your significant other, send in a report.

Federation of Surgical Specialty Associations (FSSA)

The Federation is the corporate body of the Specialty Surgical Associations, through which it represents and coordinates the views, aims and policies of surgeons from across the United Kingdom and Ireland. As Chair, I attend FSSA on behalf of BAOMS. It is a very active organisation and in the last 12 months it has generated two new (separate) organisations, Surgical Expert Ltd and the Confederation of British Surgery - a surgical trade union. Medical Experts aims to create an organisation to protect patients and colleagues against 'hired guns' by requiring their experts to be in relevant practice, have appropriate training, and to submit two author reports. More information on both will be circulated to BAOMS members as it becomes available.

Elections and appointments

Following a recent nominations process for a place for one Fellow on Council there were no eligible nominations received. Therefore the process is being re-run. Many thanks to Mr Robert Bentley who demits in December 2017 following his three year term but will be President Designate in 2018.
