



She had been a member of the Panel of Question Writers for Part1 of the Intercollegiate FRCS(OMFS) since 2017 and also a Cleft Collective PI (Addenbrookes).

In 2018, with 2 colleagues, she was a founding member of The Society of Women in Maxillofacial Surgery (SWIMS), a group that provides support, mentorship and advice to aspiring and experienced female OMFS surgeons, and is the current President.

She qualified in Dentistry from the University of Sheffield and has gained experience in paediatric dentistry, restorative dentistry and OMFS in the South East before pursuing her medical degree at the University of Manchester, qualifying in 2004. Following basic surgical training in Manchester she undertook Speciality Training in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery at one of Europe's largest Maxillofacial Surgery Service in Liverpool. She completed National TIG Fellowship in Cleft Lip and Palate Surgery in Leeds, Newcastle and GSTT, London, prior to which she completed a TIG Cosmetic Fellowship in Mersey Deanery.

In 2017 she was selected for The Nye Bevan Leadership Programme for Aspirant Executive Directors, with the NHS Leadership Academy, specifically designed to develop senior leaders to enable them to meet the challenges of a modern NHS. This has supported her in her director role and as part of the Management Executive of one of the 10 Shelford Group hospitals.

'Microvascular reconstruction in Ethiopia. A Journey'

I have been a Consultant for 18 years working in Yorkshire originally at Leeds & Pinderfields then moving to Hull 7 years ago to focus on facial reconstruction. Hull university Teaching hospitals cover a population of over 1.3 million or 2.3 if one includes craniofacial trauma. We cover as far south as Lincolnshire which encompasses Grimsby, Scunthorpe & Goole. This includes shipping, oil rigs & off shore windfarms. HUTH is a tertiary centre & is a cancer & trauma centre

I trained initially in General Surgery as a registrar before taking up a formal specialist training in OMFS in the Yorkshire region. My main interests are Head & Neck reconstruction especially using 3D virtual planning alongside microvascular free tissue transfer. I am the lead for all skin surgery on the South Bank of the Humber. I don't just confine myself to the Head & Neck. I teach local doctors & nurses all aspects of skin surgery.

I have been visiting Addis Ababa in Ethiopia every year with the charity Facing Africa since 2007. We specialise in facial reconstruction with respect to Noma. However we are fast becoming experts in Hyena bite management. Very different to dog bites! We have, in selected cases, managed large benign tumours & have been the subject of two Channel 5 documentaries titled Critical Surgery, Saving Lives. I have strong views on "fly in fly out" surgery & I am proud that our Charity doesn't practice this. Every visit I teach karate to a local club, which at 6,000 feet is very interesting.

My research interests are mainly in Noma & I have published several papers.

Outside of work my main interests are weight training & cycling. Now the weather has changed it's time to get out my fixed gear.
